

PROPOSED NEW CITY FACILITIES – EMERGENCY HUB

- At the coast, environmental events can occur including storms like those of 1996 and 2007 or the tornado of 2016. Oregon's Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) has identified that there is a risk of an earthquake off the Oregon coast caused by a Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake, which would be followed by a tsunami.
- If the bond passes, the total tax assessment would be \$0.9233 per \$1,000 of assessed property values. That would be an increase of \$0.50 per \$1,000 of assessed property values.
- If the bond passes, the new city facilities would include an Emergency Operation Center and flexible space in the Police Department that could be quickly repurposed in an emergency.
- The proposed principal functions of the Emergency Hub would be:
 - City Government: To enable City government to function in response to a city-specific emergency.
 - Communications: To communicate with the regional Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at Fire Station 13 on Hwy 101. During an emergency, Manzanita would have city-specific communications. The EOC would be a nexus of control for a regional emergency but it would not be a center for the community to gather and seek relief.
 - Community Response: To provide a focus for the community to prepare for and respond to a natural or man-made disaster, including short-term (1-3 days) care for displaced residents and visitors.
- The Emergency Hub would plan for 1,000 people to arrive after an earthquake, and stay there for up to three days until aftershocks subside.
- If the bond does not pass, the tax assessment would not be made and the new facilities would not be constructed.
